

NEIGHBORHOOD IMPROVEMENT PROJECT GRANT

Information Sheet

PURPOSE OF PROGRAM:

To strengthen a neighborhood's appearance with the **addition of permanent physical improvements**

To promote a greater sense of community through **resident participation in a neighborhood project**

ELIGIBLE PROJECTS:

Permanent physical improvements to the neighborhood on public or private property

The projects must result in an improved appearance to the neighborhood which **positively affects a significant number of residents**

GRANT APPLICATION PROCESS:

Grant application materials can be picked up from the City Manager's Office, 515 Clark Avenue, or can be mailed by calling 515-239-5101. Completed applications should be submitted to the City Manager's Office as follows:

GRANT AMOUNT

A maximum of \$5,000 per year per application.

LOCAL MATCH REQUIREMENT:

Project should reflect a direct contribution of \$1.00 in cash or in-kind labor (or a combination of both), valued at \$1.00 for every \$1.00 of City funds received.

DECISION CRITERIA:

Resident involvement

- Number of residents donating their time and/or labor to accomplish project
- Number of residents donating funds to the project

- Number of residents who will be positively affected by the improvement



RATING OF APPLICATIONS:

The City Manager will make final recommendations to the City Council regarding which projects should be funded. However, the City Manager will solicit input by utilizing a Rating Team comprised of four neighborhood representatives, a City Engineer from the Public Works Department, and a City Planner from the Planning & Housing Department. This group will rate each application according to the following point system:

Resident Involvement.....	30 points*
Project Impact	30 points**
Safety	10 points
Public Space.....	10 points
Improved Housing.....	10 points
Environment.....	<u>10 points</u>
	100 points
*10 points 1-25 people, 20 points 26-50 people, 30 points over 50 people	
**10 points 1-25 people, 20 points 26-100 people, 30 points over 100 people	

FUNDING DECISIONS:

Final funding decisions will be made by the City Council based on recommendations from the City Manager.

	Total cost of project:	\$3,600
