## SIGNIFICANCE SUMMARY

Ames High School is locally significant under Criterion A as it is associated with development and early consolidation of high school educational facilities in Ames, Iowa and is locally significant under Criterion C as it embodies significant characteristics of the Classical Revival style. Evaluation of the Ames High School for National Register eligibility is based upon criteria outlined in the Multiple Property Documentation Form *Public Schools for Iowa: Growth and Change, 1848-1966* (Beedle and Deiber 2002) under the property type "City High School." Ames High School was built to accommodate the city's entire high school population, which was previously housed in schools on the north and south sides of the city. The school, which was designed by Tinsley, McBroom and Higgins, has all of the hallmarks of the Classical Revival style including three entrance pavilions comprised of limestone pilasters, limestone entablatures with dentil molding, and pediments. The school has a high degree of integrity on its exterior and retains its integrity of design, location, feeling, setting, and association. Despite major renovation of the interior, the school building does retain its integrity of feeling, setting and association, with a number of key interior spaces remaining intact to convey the building's original character and finishes. Ames High School meets all of the requirements for registration of the city high school type including separate gymnasium and auditorium and specialized rooms for courses like home economics and art.

## RESOURCE HISTORY AND HISTORIC CONTEXT

Old Central School was built in 1887 on Clark Avenue and housed both elementary and high school grades. By 1900, an addition was constructed to accommodate an increasing enrollment. In 1911, the first high school building in Ames was constructed across the street from Old Central. It contained a 700-seat auditorium, gymnasium, specialized classrooms, and a library. A second high school building, called Lincoln, was approved for the south side of town that same year.

Increases in high school enrollment in the 1930s led to the construction of Ames High School on the site of Old Central School, which was razed in 1936. Original plans for the school called for classrooms only. The city unexpectedly received a PWA grant to construct an auditorium and gymnasium. Construction began in 1937 and was not completed until 1939. Junior high and high school students attended half-day classes during construction. The school continued to be used as a high school until 1967 when a new high school was constructed on 20<sup>th</sup> Street. The Ames High School then became Central Junior High School. The school was abandoned in the mid 1980s when a new middle school was built. The city administration reoccupied the former high school in 1989 to consolidate scattered city offices.

The firm of Tinsley, McBroom and Higgins was established in 1929 after Burdette Higgins joined the firm of Tinsley and McBroom. The firm's first major commission was the Bankers Life Insurance Company building in Des Moines, which was featured in an article in Architectural Record magazine. Other major commissions by the firm include the Physical Education Building, Wilhem Hall, and Spedding Hall at Iowa State University, the United Benefit Life Office Building in Omaha, Nebraska, and numerous homes in Ottumwa, Iowa.
