CENSUS INVITATIONS PROVIDE OPTIONS TO "CLAIM AMES"

The 2020 Census counts every person living in the 50 states, District of Columbia, and five U.S. territories. The count is mandated by the Constitution and conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, a nonpartisan government agency. Every home in Ames will receive an invitation to respond to a short questionnaire - online, by phone, or by mail. This will mark the first time that the census will take place online!

Remember to "Claim Ames" when you complete and return your census form. This is an important step to ensure Ames has an accurate count and receives all the federal funding we deserve. Iowa State University students living in Ames



should remember census guidelines direct college students to claim the commuity they live in the majority of the year.

The census provides critical data that lawmakers, business owners, teachers, and many others use to provide daily services, products, and support for you and your community. Every year, \$675 billion in federal funding goes to hospitals, fire departments, schools, roads, and other resources based on census data. The results of the census also determine the number of seats each state will have in the U.S. House of Representatives and are used to draw congressional and state legislative districts.

Returning a census form is safe, easy, and important. Remember to "Claim Ames!"

CITY RECEIVES FLOOD MITIGATION GRANT FOR SQUAW CREEK

There's good news for a project to address flooding concerns along Squaw Creek. The U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) announced a grant to the State of Iowa that includes funding for Ames. The Ames City Council recently approved a funding agreement with FEMA to move the project forward. Through a nationally competitive grant process, the City of Ames is receiving funds for the Squaw Creek Flood Mitigation project to lower flood levels in the South Duff Avenue area. The grant will cover 75 percent of the project's \$4.9 million cost, or \$3.7 million.

"The South Duff Avenue area has experienced four major flooding events that each significantly impacted area residents, businesses, and infrastructure. The most recent was in 2010," said Tracy Warner, Municipal Engineer. "Securing a federal grant to fund the Squaw Creek project moves us towards the goal of mitigating impacts of future flooding."

The Squaw Creek Flood Mitigation project is estimated to reduce flooding by two feet along the major flood damage center in the South Duff Avenue commercial corridor. The project will include channel excavation of Squaw Creek at South Duff Avenue to improve creek capacity and resilience in large storm events. Additionally, the project will use stabilization techniques including natural channel design, streambank toe protection, and planting native vegetation to increase protection to area development.

EcoFair Provides Education, Information, and Fun on April 25



Q: What can I do to make the best choices for the environment? With both big choices and small ones, it can be confusing to know what's really helping.

A: Great question. It can be difficult to know the right thing to do, but doing a little research can provide some direction. The internet is full of "The Top 10 Ways to ...", and energy conservation is no exception. Replacing your old light bulbs with LEDs, washing your clothes in cold water, and buying green energy are some easy changes that really do make a difference!

There are also bigger decisions that can drastically reduce your carbon footprint. These are things you may not be able to put on your weekend to-do list, but you can keep them in mind for the next time you're considering moving or purchasing a car.

1. Reduce the number of miles you drive. This might mean more stay-cations or getting some extra exercise while walking or biking to work, school, or errands. The "walkability" of your neighborhood will affect your ability to do these things without a car. It might be a factor you consider the next time you move.

- 2. Reduce your emissions per mile. When you're looking for a new car, prioritize those with better gas mileage. An electric car would further reduce your emissions per mile. Power Off? Start Here!

Check if the power is off in the whole house or just part of it. Also, check your main electric panel to see if a breaker has tripped or fuse has blown. If the problem is not in your panel, check if your neighbors have been affected. Report your outage by calling the outage reporting sytem at 515.239.5240. You will be asked to provide your name, address of the outage, and phone number at the outage address.
