


POLICE HYBRID VEHICLES REDUCE FUEL USAGE

The Ames Police Department recently debuted the new Ford Police Interceptor Utility Hybrids. This is the second hybrid patrol vehicle in the Police Department fleet. Because the vehicle has proved efficient and reliable, the department

plans to replace the remaining patrol vehicles with Ford Police Interceptor Utility Hybrids in the future.

KLAAS HONORED WITH ADA HAYDEN STONE

Ames Parks and Recreation Department and the Friends of Ada Hayden Heritage Park recently held a dedication ceremony for the addition of a heritage stone at Ada Hayden Heritage Park honoring Dr. Erwin Klaas.

Ada Hayden Heritage Park currently has nine heritage stones placed throughout the park recognizing individuals who have made significant contributions to the conservation of natural resources in Iowa. The Friends of Ada Hayden Heritage Park, a partner in the management of the park, proposed the addition of a 10th stone to honor Dr. Klaas because of his efforts in getting the park established and his continued effort in renovating the park to its native habitat.

Dr. Klaas's contributions to conservation in Iowa started in 1975 when he served as Professor of Animal Ecology and a leader of the Cooperative Fish and Wildlife Unit at Iowa State University until his retirement in 1999. After retirement, he used his knowledge and connections with Iowa State and the Ames community to organize a sampling of the plants and animals at the abandoned rock quarry on the north side of Ames.

SIGN, SIGN, EVERYWHERE A SIGN

Many Ames residents like to support a candidate, announce a yard sale, or cheer on the home team with a temporary yard sign. However, there are rules about sign



placement. When locating the right spot for your yard sign, please keep in mind:

Signs should be placed behind the property line and are

prohibited in the public right-of-way, which is the area between the curb and the sidewalk. For properties without sidewalks, the right-of-way width varies, but it is usually the first 14.5 feet behind the curb in residential neighborhoods. Some other considerations:

- Residents may not place signs on public property such as medians, near intersections, in parks, or on utility poles.
- Signs should never block the view of oncoming traffic or create a hazard. Signs that affect visibility are subject to removal.
- Temporary signs may not be displayed for more than 90 consecutive days without removal or replacement.

Q: Several months ago, I saw the article announcing the groundbreaking for the SunSmart Community Solar Project. What's the status of the project now?

A: There are lots of changes happening at the site lately! The access road and fencing have been installed. Posts for the array of solar panels are being installed now, and shortly the 'racking' (structural beams from one post to another to which panels will be attached) will be installed. If the work continues as planned, you will begin to see solar panels appearing throughout October.

There are still lots of electrical pieces that have to come together before the farm can start delivering electricity to customers, but we're on-track for that to happen by the end of December! That would mean we'd see electricity delivered for the first time in the month of January 2021. But be patient with us! Keep in mind that your electric bill is always a month behind your actual usage. That will be the case for SunSmart credits as well. Customers should expect to see their first credits in February or March, depending on their individual billing cycle.

If you haven't signed up to be part of the SunSmart Ames Community Solar Project, you can find costs, forms, and other information at www.CityOfAmes.org/Solar. As always, give me a call at 515.239.5177 if you have any trouble or questions.

Another aspect of the solar farm that we're excited about is the plant species planned for the site. The vegetation under the panels will be native species carefully chosen by numerous local experts to best support pollinators like bees and

butterflies. The shrubs planted around the farm will also be native species intended to provide food and habitat for birds and other wildlife. A bioswale is also included in the plans to more responsibly manage stormwater runoff.

We're looking forward to all the pieces of this project coming together!

You will be asked to provide your name, address of the outage, and phone number at the outage address.
