First organized by Dave and Janie Degeneffe-Brenner for homes along Marston and Roosevelt avenues, it has grown in popularity over the last 10-plus years. This year, the Roosevelt Neighborhood joined in the display, expanding the luminaries to Harding Avenue and other streets in the neighborhood.

Looking for a socially-distanced holiday event for their neighborhood, Roosevelt NA board member Erin Gibson reached out to the Fmanon NA about joining in their annual luminary display and was warmly welcomed.

Word was spread about participating in the annual display through the Emanon NA newsletter, on Roosevelt Neighborhood Facebook group, and with flyers posted at Roosevelt Park and distributed to neighbors. To assist Roosevelt NA in participation, Gibson provided luminary supplies for neighbors to use.

The luminaries were lit at dusk and many neighbors walked through the area to enjoy the display.

MASK MANDATE EXTENDED

The Ames City Council recently amended the face-covering ordinance, extending it through June 30, 2021. Every person age 3 and older must wear a face covering that completely covers the person's nose and mouth in any indoor setting or establishment where the public is invited and in any outside public setting where physical distancing of a least 6 feet isn't possible. USE FWD PROGRAM FOR FOOD WASTE

Holiday dinners usually lead to leftovers and a lot of food waste. To help keep food waste out of the landfill, the City of Ames offers FWD, a Food Waste Diversion program. Participants can use their own container, or buy an FWD Starter Pack with a bucket, lid and instruction brochure. When your bucket is full, take it to the Resource Recover Plant, 110 Center Ave. Orange containers on the north side (East Second Street) of the plant are available for disposing organic waste at no charge year-round, 24/7.
