EMERGENCY BROADBAND BENEFIT OFFERED

The Emergency Broadband Benefit is a temporary FCC program to help households struggling to afford internet service during the pandemic. Eligible households are now able to enroll in the program to receive a monthly discount off the cost of broadband service from an approved provider.

In Ames, local internet providers including Mediacom and Verizon are participants in the Emergency Broadband Benefit program. Eligible households can access a list of approved providers and apply by visiting www. GetEmergencyBroadband.org

The \$3.2 billion Emergency Broadband Benefit program provides a discount of up to a \$50 per month toward broadband service for eligible households. The benefit also provides up to a \$100 per household discount toward a one-time purchase of a computer, laptop, or tablet.

The City of Ames and Ames Public Library have joined the FCC to raise awareness about the Emergency Broadband Benefit. The Ames Public Library is offering computer access to the public, and Library staff can provide basic guidance to those applying for the benefit.

AMES NAMED "TREE CITY USA"

The City of Ames has again been recognized by the Arbor Day Foundation and the Iowa Department of Natural Resources as a "Tree

City USA" by demonstrating a commitment to caring for and managing public trees. To qualify for the Tree City USA award, a city must have either a city forester or an active city tree

board, have a tree



ordinance, spend at least \$2 per capita annually for its community forestry program, and have a tree planting and maintenance plan.

The City of Ames has been a recognized "Tree City USA" since 1983. The Tree City USA program is a national program that provides the framework for community forestry management for cities and towns across America. Ames has approximately 11,000 right-of-way trees, 3,500 park trees, and 700 to 800 acres of public-owned woodland

areas. The Parks and Recreation Department and City Forester perform all the work necessary to maintain the health of these trees.

"Trees are an important part of Ames and enhance the environment in many ways," said City Forester Paul Tauke. Trees absorb carbon dioxide, improve water quality through filtration and

erosion control, provide temperature control and wind breaks, and support wildlife habitat necessary for biodiversity. "Assessing the need for pruning or removal and replacement ensures that we maintain a healthy and diverse stock of trees," said Tauke.

WATER RATES TO INCREASE

With the completion of the 2021-2022 fiscal budget, the City has identified one utility fee increase that will begin on July 1. Water rates will increase 6 percent.

The need for the proposed rate adjustment is a combination of multiple factors. A series of construction projects is planned over the next 10 years that is intended to accomplish three things: replace aging infrastructure; increase resiliency to both natural and man-made disasters; and to stay ahead of anticipated growth in the Ames community.

Additionally, periodic adjustments are needed to keep pace with the increase in routine operating expenses such as chemicals, energy, and labor. Power Off? Start Here.

Check if the power is off in the whole house or just part of it. Also, check your main electric panel to see if a breaker has tripped or fuse has blown. If the problem is not in your panel, check if your neighbors have been affected. Report your outage by calling the outage reporting system at 515.239.5240. You will be asked to

provide your name, address of the outage, and phone number at the outage address.

CALL BEFORE YOU DIG

Be careful and call Iowa One Call before you dig. Have your yard marked free of charge. Now it's even easier: call 800.292.8989 or just dial 811.

ENERGY Q&A

Q. There's a lot of focus right now on electric vehicles, but are they as good as they say? Also, is there enough investment in local and national infrastructure to make them a practical choice?

A. Electric vehicles (called EVs) use local, sustainable energy. EVs charged with electricity from Ames Electric reduce greenhouse gas emissions by over 60% compared to a gasoline vehicle. Instead of gasoline shipped in from all over the world, EVs charge with locally sourced energy, including wind, solar, and waste-to-energy generation.

EVs can be grid resources. EVs are unique electric appliances. The average vehicle is parked about 95% of the time, and only needs a full charge once a week. That means that the time at which the vehicle is charged can usually be flexible, so you can choose to charge when there tends to be an excess of wind energy available on the grid, between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m.

EVs are more affordable than ever. You can reduce your "fuel" costs by 60% when you drive electric! And you can count on those savings into the future because electricity prices are notoriously more stable than gasoline and other fossil fuels. And finally, more of the money you spend on charging stays in the local economy, where your electricity is generated.

EVs are fun to drive. Electric vehicles are smooth, super responsive, and almost silent. If you haven't driven an EV,

I recommend that you take a test drive when you get the opportunity!

If you're considering a switch to an electric vehicle, be sure to look at the resources at www. CityOfAmes.org/ev, including rebates for EV chargers, information about tax incentives, and



a full handbook about Electric Vehicles in Ames.

As for infrastructure? Yes, that's being built. More communities, including Ames, are making the investment in electric charging stations. In fact, Ames Electric Services has received three grants from the Volkswagen Settlement Environmental Mitigation Trust totaling \$157,200 to install two DC fast chargers near the I-35 and US 30 interchange and two Level 2 community chargers at the Ames Intermodal Facility and in west Ames.
