# Donate, Shop, or Volunteer at Rummage RAMPage 2021

After skipping a year due to the pandemic, the fifth Rummage RAMPage will return to the Ames Intermodal Facility parking ramp, 129 Hayward Ave., from Friday, July 30, through Saturday, Aug. 7.

The City of Ames, in partnership with the ISU Office of Sustainability, hosts this community garage sale designed to keep reusable items out of the waste stream. The event grew from the desire to repurpose items often left on the curb during the annual move out and lease changeovers, and to keep these items out of the landfill. Rummage RAMPage works by selling items that are donated. Volunteers from local non-profit groups help run the sale and share in any profit.

"With the large number of lease changeovers at the end of July, the event 

provides an alternative for residents who are not only looking to dispose of household goods, but also acquire still-usable items that might be thrown in the trash or randomly dumped otherwise," said Resource Recovery Plant Superintendent Bill Schmitt.

Donations may be dropped off at the Intermodal Facility from noon to 6 p.m. on Friday, July 30, and during sale hours from Saturday, July 31, through Friday, Aug. 6. No donations will be accepted on the last day of the sale, Saturday, Aug. 7.

# Moving? Don't Leave Your Pets Behind!

Graduating, moving, or leaving over a school break are all very exciting changes, but these events may pose some logistical questions. How are you going to move your aquarium? Who will watch your pet if you move? Does your new apartment allow snakes? There are many decisions to be made, but this one is always wrong: never dump your tank into a waterway or release your pet into the wild.

Most pets released to the wild do not survive, and many suffer before they die. If they do manage to survive, they can wreak major havoc! Releasing non-native plants or animals into natural areas can harm the environment and the economy.



Many plants used in aquariums become invasive species if introduced into a natural system. Some of the most notorious invasive species in the United States were originally sold as pets or plants for water gardens and aquariums.

Prospective pet owners should make sure they will be able to accommodate all life stages of a pet before buying or adopting it. If your circumstances change, the responsible choice is to find your pet a new home. If you are not able to place your pet with another caring owner, contact the Ames Animal Shelter (515.239.5530), a natural resource agency, or even a pet store near you. The knowledgeable personnel in these places can help you find the right place for your pet.

# ENERGY Q&A

Q: How can I keep my home cooler while using less electricity this summer?

A: Last winter I received a question about energy efficient heating, and one of my suggestions was to pay attention to solar exposure and heat gain. As much as those great, big, southern-facing windows reduce your heating needs in the winter by increasing solar heat gain, they increase your cooling load in the summer for the same reason.

Shading the southern exposure of your home can significantly reduce solar gain, and there are many techniques that you can use selectively in the summer, so you can still enjoy the sun's heat in the winter.

Deciduous trees are a great way to shade the south side of your home. As long as they drop their leaves before the winter, they won't block much of the sunlight that you want during the colder months but will effectively shade your home in the summer. Purposefully-placed trellises and plants that grow aggressively in the spring can also provide significant window shading. These options could also provide food for you and/or wildlife, habitat, and add beauty and value to your home.

For smaller windows, an overhang of the right dimensions will block sunshine in the summer that comes into your windows at a higher angle, but not in the winter. For larger windows, the overhang will shade the upper portion of the window, but exterior sun shades are more effective at protecting large windows or glass doors from sun exposure. Many exterior

shades are motorized and can be raised and lowered from inside the home with a wall-mounted switch, remote control, or smart phone app.



Interior window coverings are more common, and you may have some in your home already. They can reduce solar gain by 35 percent, but the space between the window and the curtain or blind still collects solar energy. Intercepting sunshine before it reaches your window with the methods described above is much more effective, reducing solar gain by up to 80 percent!
