

How Can You Report a Power Outage? Text Us!

With the new year, Ames Electric Services customers will have a new way to contact the utility during a power outage. Beginning Jan. 1, 2022, texting your power outage will be an option! Before those thumbs get ready to text, make sure your cell phone and address are in our system.

Customers who want to use the texting feature must update or register their mobile phone number to their account. Without this, the automated Outage Management System will have a difficult time responding to your location. To update or register a phone number, go to www.CityOfAmes.org/Outage. You can also call the Utility Customer Services at 515.239.5120 to have your information updated.

The number to report your power outage remains the same whether you call or text: 515.239.5240.

To use the texting option, customers should send the word "Out" and follow the prompts to report the outage. Ames

Electric Services is excited to offer this new service as texting is a quick

and reliable form of communication. Allowing customers to text an outage saves time for both the customer and the utility. Texting allows the utility to push out a text message to confirm dates and locations with greater



accuracy and higher response rates.

RECYCLE YOUR CHRISTMAS TREE

ARE YOU ON A SNOW ROUTE?

How do you know when the snow ordinance is in effect? Pay attention to local media, check the City's website (www.CityOfAmes.org), or watch City of Ames and Ames Police social media! The snow ordinance goes into effect when snow



accumulations are 2 inches or more, but the best way to know if the snow ordinance will be in effect is to watch the weather!

KEEP HYDRANTS CLEAR FROM SNOW

As snow piles up along the curb, it does more than hamper visibility for drivers. Mounds

of snow can obscure locations of fire hydrants. Ames firefighters ask residents to check fire hydrants located near their homes or businesses



to ensure they are visible. If the fire hydrant is covered, we need your help! Please clear a three-foot-wide area around the hydrant to ensure firefighters can locate it. During a fire emergency, every second counts. If you need assistance clearing the hydrant, call Fire Station No. 1 at 515.239.5109.

Q: Why is carbon monoxide such a concern during the winter months? What steps can I take to increase safety during this time of the year?

In the colder months, many of us are using more fossil fuels in our homes for heating. If you have any natural gas appliances in your home, you should be aware of how to protect your family from carbon monoxide poisoning. Carbon monoxide is an odorless, colorless gas produced when fuel burns. If a fuel-burning device such as a furnace, kerosene heater, or gas stove is installed, operated, or vented incorrectly, the carbon monoxide it gives off can build up in the air. Should the concentration of carbon monoxide get high enough, it can cause carbon monoxide poisoning.

Symptoms may be hard to recognize because at first they are much like symptoms of the flu: headache, weakness, dizziness, and nausea. Other symptoms can include shortness of breath, chest pain, confusion, loss of consciousness, and heart arrhythmias. If you suspect carbon monoxide in your home or experience symptoms, call the Ames Fire Department at 515.239.5109.

How to protect your family from carbon monoxide poisoning:

- Leave installation and service of natural gas appliances to a professional.
- Install carbon monoxide detectors and be sure to keep the batteries fresh. Many people use the beginning and end of daylight saving time as a reminder to check carbon monoxide and smoke detectors.
- Install an exhaust fan over gas stoves. Turn it on any time you are using the stove.
- Consider high-efficiency electric appliances the next time you have to replace your furnace, water heater, or oven/stove. Check out www.CityofAmes.org/
