#### The Reminders

Delayed by the pandemic, The Reminders are finally heading to Ames! On March 1, 4, and 5, this incredible hip-hop duo from Denver, Colo., will hold workshops with youth from YSS, Boys and Girls Club, Ames

Public Library Teen Group, and the Ames Middle School.

The husband-wife performers showcase positive expression through music and dance. The Reminders will be holding a hiphop dance workshop and a TED-style interactive seminar about



the history of hip hop culture that will be open to the public. The Reminders will conclude with a concert at the Auditorium at 7 p.m. on Saturday, March 5.

This event was funded by the Iowa Arts Council and Arts Midwest. It is being presented in partnership with the Ames Public Library, Ames Human Relations Commission, Iowa State University Lectures, and the Ames Police Foundation.

#### ISU Takeover

On Friday, March 25, student bands from Iowa State University will take over the Auditorium stage for an evening of live performances

starting at 7 p.m. This event is being held in partnership with the student music club GENRE and will be the first of its kind at the Auditorium. It will be both livestreamed and in-person.

## CITY PARTNERS TO MONITOR HEALTH OF LOCAL WATERWAYS

In 2021, the City partnered with citizen volunteers and groups in Story County to implement the first year of a 10year Story County Water Monitoring and Interpretation Plan. The purpose of the plan is to collect and analyze water sampling data, increase resident's knowledge and understanding, identify problems in our watersheds, and support and improve water quality.

Citizen volunteers from throughout the county tested samples from waterways, supplementing testing performed by Ames Water and Pollution Control staff. In addition to monitoring 35 sites, seven educational events were held, dozens of presentations scheduled, and many articles were published about water quality and watersheds. Over the remaining nine years of the plan,

monitoring will aid in evaluating the benefits of stream and watershed projects and in determining future project needs. There are plenty of opportunities to volunteer towards these efforts.

City Boards and Commissions have continued to meet virtually throughout the pandemic and transitioned back to in-person meetings. There are 20 different boards and commissions, and 16 of those have vacancies occurring in the first part of 2022. While some current volunteers may seek reappointment, there are always vacancies that need to be filled.

### Assessor's Office Reminds Residents of Tax Credits

The City Assessor's Office reminds homeowners they may qualify for the Homestead Property Tax Credit and/ or the Military Property Tax Exemption.



Please stop by the Assessor's Office in City Hall to complete an application if you've never signed up. The Homestead Credit is issued to property owners residing in their property at least six months each year.

## Public Budget Meetings Scheduled

The City of Ames began preparing for the Fiscal Year 2022-23 budget last fall with a series of internal staff meetings. Work continues throughout the winter months as each department's budget is reviewed internally prior to presentation to the Ames City Council. There are still plenty of opportunities to get involved.

In February, three meetings are planned for representatives of each of the City's departments to present an in-depth review of proposed budgets. All budget meetings will be held in

the City Hall Council Chambers, 515 Clark Ave., and will be streamed on City of Ames Facebook and YouTube. A livestream is also available at www. CityOfAmes.org/AmesTV

A wrap-up of the budget will be held at 5:15 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 8. Setting the maximum levy rate will take place at the Council meeting beginning at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 22, and the final budget

hearing is scheduled for 6 p.m. on Tuesday, March 8. It will include an opportunity for public comments. This is also a regularly scheduled City Council meeting.

Like all Iowa communities, the City of Ames must submit its budget to the State of Iowa for certification by the end of March. Budget documents for the current fiscal year are posted on the City's website, and draft documents for 2022-23 will be posted by early February. For more information, go to www.CityOfAmes. org.

# ENERGY Q&A

Q: As the temperatures drop, I'm getting more concerned about my energy bills this winter. I don't have a lot of extra income to make major investments. Are there other options out there? What can I do?

Does your home feel chilly this year? Maybe it's time to weatherize your home to make it more comfortable and energy efficient. Did you know there is a program that supports

weatherization projects for low-income residents?

The Weatherization Assistance Program is a federally funded program that helps low-income individuals lower their energy costs and improve comfort in their homes through insulation and other building envelope improvements. Residents of

If you don't qualify for assistance through the Weatherization

Assistance Program, you can find resources about DIY weatherization projects or sign up for a professional energy audit on our website at www.CityofAmes.org/SmartEnergy. If you're on the fence about an investment in improving your home's energy efficiency, an auditor can help you better understand the opportunities and potential impact of insulation or home 'tightening' projects.

For some low-cost, energy-saving options that don't require a lot money, consider these helpful tips:

- Set your thermostat down at night and at times during the day when occupants are at work or school.
- Fix drafty doors and windows using inexpensive, easy-to-apply tools like weather-stripping.
- Close the vents and doors to rooms that aren't used.
   Keep window shades and curtains drawn to retain heat.
- Unplug unused electronics. Many items may still be using electricity even when off. "Vampire electronics" can add unneeded costs to your utility bill.
