Two New Electric Buses to Join CyRide Fleet

CyRide will soon be getting two new battery electric buses, which are scheduled to be delivered early this summer. These clean vehicles were funded by the Federal Transit Administration Low- or No-Emission Grant program for \$1.6 million and the Iowa Department of Transportation Volkswagen Settlement Environmental Mitigation Trust for \$390,000.

The new buses will lower carbon emissions, control noise pollution, and reduce the operating costs of CyRide's large bus fleet. Instead of an engine burning diesel fuel, these vehicles run from 564-kWh batteries, which could power a house for an entire month. These buses will look familiar as they are from the same manufacturer as CyRide's articulated buses.

"This is terrific news for CyRide, our riders, and the Ames community," said Transit Director Barbara Neal. "Supporting public transportation is a great way to reduce your own carbon footprint, while moving to electric buses will help



CyRide reduce its emissions. We are grateful for the funding and excited to implement this next phase of public transit improvements."

The new electric buses will feature a special exterior bus wrap design selected through an online competition that highlights the electric power source. In addition to the electric buses, CyRide continues to reduce its carbon footprint through hybrid buses, hybrid driver relief vehicles, biodiesel fuels, an energy-efficient administrative building, and solar-powered bus

SAVE THE DATE: RUMMAGE RAMPAGE RETURNS

Mark your calendars for the sixth annual Rummage RAMPage, which begins with donations drop-off on Friday, July 29, and continues through Saturday, Aug. 6, as the final day of shopping.

The City of Ames, in partnership with the ISU Office of Sustainability and local non-profit



organizations, holds this community-wide garage sale to keep reusable items out of the waste stream. Items are donated for sale, and volunteers from local non-profit groups help run the sale and share in any profit. The event is held at the Ames Intermodal Parking Ramp, 129 Hayward Ave.

"This event grew from the desire to repurpose items often left on the curb during the annual move out and lease changeovers, and to keep these items out of the landfill," said Resource Recovery Plant Superintendent Bill Schmitt. "With the large number of lease changeovers at the end of July, the event provides an alternative for residents who are not only looking to dispose of household goods, but also acquire still-usable items that might be thrown in the trash or randomly dumped otherwise."

Rummage RAMPage has continued to grow each year. In 2021, this event diverted 90,000 pounds of furniture and housewares from the landfill and raised more than \$40,000 for local non-profit agencies. Q: The Ames City Council has made establishing a Climate Action Plan a priority. Is Ames Electric Services involved in creating the plan?

Excellent question. The short answer is yes! Ames Electric Services is involved in the new climate action planning initiative. A Climate Action Plan (CAP) provides the framework and actions needed to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in a community. The Ames City Council has made developing a plan a priority, but also has set an ambitious goal to reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions and achieve netzero emissions by 2050. Developing a CAP is a tool that helps communities understand their influence on GHGs, and allows them to reduce their carbon footprint while still supporting community well-being and economic growth.

Additionally, a CAP helps communities to align their infrastructure planning processes with their GHG reduction targets, and identify opportunities to integrate local renewable energy solutions. Ames Electric Services plays an important role in the creation of a community CAP because up to one-third of GHG emissions in Ames are connected back to electric production.

The electric utility continues to take steps to reduce that number through investments in the SunSmart Ames Community Solar Farm, contracts for wind energy, exploring new renewable opportunities: www.CityOfAmes.org/Sustainability on the "Climate Action Plan" green box.



options, and involvement in the City's waste-to-energy study, which is determining future investments in the Resource Recovery Plant.

Another important role of Ames Electric Services in community carbon reduction is through expanding electric vehicle (EV) infrastructure. In addition to adding public EV chargers around the community, Ames Electric Services offers EV charging rebates to customers who add chargers to their homes. Creating a CAP is important because investments today will determine climate and development outcomes long into the future. Reducing Ames' carbon footprint is a goal that will require the support of the entire community.
