

Join the Mayor and City Council Bike Ride on May 21

Want a reason to dust off your bike helmet and pump up the tires? Here's an event to get you excited about bicycling this spring!

Mayor John Haila and members of the City Council invite the community to participate in a family-friendly bike ride starting at Ames City Hall, 515 Clark Ave. The fourth annual Mayor and Council's Bike Ride will begin at 9 a.m. on Saturday, May 21. Bikers should gather in the west parking lot.

Bicyclists of all ages and experience levels are welcome to join the ride. There is no pre-registration necessary or cost to participate. Bike helmets are



strongly encouraged. Watch the City of Ames website (www.CityOfAmes.org) for more information, a route map, and how to get involved! This year's bike route will include a visit to the Tedesco Environmental Learning Corridor, which is a Story County park inside the Ames city limits.

"With May being National Bike Month, it's a great fit to offer this fun, spring event," said Mayor Haila. "Enjoying a community bike ride is a terrific way to celebrate the many benefits of bicycling as well as enjoying the sights of our city. The route south this year will allow us to take a few extras stops and explore new bike paths."

NEW EQUIPMENT HELPS REPAIR INFRASTRUCTURE QUICKLY

It's not uncommon to see Ames Public Works crews and assorted equipment around the city performing maintenance and repair. Department responsibilities include streets, signage, infrastrucure, and more! Patching a pothole or testing traffic signals are routine fixes, but sometimes - particularly when the work is underground - it's less clear what's happening.

Recently, Public Works employees began using



equipment to locate blockages in the sanitary sewer system. This equipment allows crews to work faster and more efficiently.

The Sewer Line Rapid Acoustic Testing (SL-RAT for short) equipment consists

of a transmitter and receiver unit that are inserted into sanitary sewer manholes. The transmitter unit sends out an audible noise signal that travels through the sanitary sewer line and is collected by the receiving unit.

The signal is evaluated by the receiver and a score from one to 10 is given. A lower score indicates loss of a portion of the audio signal and can indicate a potential blockage or issue in the sanitary sewer.

Once a low score is found, televising and cleaning equipment is dispatched to the area to investigate and clear any obstructions.

"Utility Maintenance crews are able to investigate five to 10 times more segments per day than traditional investigation methods and at a much lower cost," said Justin Clausen, Operations Supervisor. "We save time and money, and avoid inconvenience for our

WATCH FOR TRAFFIC CREWS IN MAY

To counter the wear and tear of winter, City of Ames traffic crews will begin re-striping streets; painting curbs, crosswalks, stop bars, and symbols; and refreshing parking lot lines the first week in May. Painting takes place every year after the temperatures are warm

enough to apply paint, and surfaces have warmed enough for the paint to properly adhere. By the end of the season, crews will have painted the equivalent of a 4-inch stripe from Ames to Minnepolis, Minn., or about 200 miles of new street markings.



Street and curb painting can have a temporary impact on traffic flow by requiring brief lane closures. Although the paint applied is quick drying, drivers can help by being cautious and proceeding slowly when traveling in areas where crews are working.

Sustainability-themed EcoChats Continue Monthly Through June

SEWER RATES TO INCREASE IN JULY

The Ames City Council will give final approval in May to a 5 percent increase in sewer rates, effective for bills due on and after July 1, 2022.

The need for the proposed rate adjustment is a combination of multiple factors. The increase will help finance a multi-year upgrade to the Ames Water Pollution Control Facility. The upgrade will allow for a significant increase in the facility's nutrient removal efficiency, ultimately achieving the goals of lowa's Nutrient Reduction Strategy.

Other projects to be financed in the next five years include a multi-million dollar renovation of the facility's headworks (the front end of the plant where the flows enter). Upgrades are planned to improve the facility's ability to accept hauled wastes. Finally, there is an ongoing program of sanitary sewer rehabilitation and replacement.

One way to reduce your water bill is through conservation. This is the time to inspect irrigation systems for frozen or broken lines and make sure heads are only delivering water to plantings that truly need to be watered.

ENERGY Q&A

Q: What is National Electrical Safety Month?

National Electrical Safety Month is recognized in May as a way to encourage safety around electricity. Electricity has become such an integral part of the day that most people give it little thought. You flip a switch and the light comes on. You push a button and your computer fires up. It's only when something goes wrong that electricity becomes a focus. It's important to remember that while electricity has created endless ways to improve our everyday lives, it can also be dangerous if not used safely.

The Electrical Safety Foundation International (ESFI) is a non-profit organization dedicated exclusively to promoting electrical safety in the home, school, and workplace. The organization encourages electric safety to reduce and eliminate electrical-related fires, fatalities, injuries, and property loss. During Electrical Safety Month, and throughout the year, Ames Electric Services continues to remind customers of the importance of being safe around electricity.

There's good reason to exercise caution. The ESFI reports that thousands of people in the United States are critically injured and electrocuted as a result of electrical fires and accidents in their own homes each year. An average of 51,000 electrical home structure fires occur each year, claiming almost 500 lives, injuring more than 1,400 people, and causing more than

\$1.3 billion in property damage (National Fire Protection Association, 2003-2007). In addition, the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission reports that nearly 400 people are electrocuted in the U.S. each year.

Electric injuries, deaths, and home fires can be prevented simply by understanding basic electrical safety principles and adhering to safe practices. Experts agree the best way to protect your family and your home against the risk of electrical fires or electrocution is to hire a qualified, licensed electrician to perform electrical work in your home.

May brings warmer weather and outdoor projects. When working outside the house, remember these tips to avoid potential dangers and stay safe this spring:

- Ladders that come into contact with a power line can prove fatal. Keep all ladders at least 10 feet away from overhead power lines.
- Unplug outdoor tools and appliances when not in use.
- Inspect power tools and appliances for frayed cords, broken plugs, and cracked or broken housing. Repair or replace damaged items.
- Water and electricity do not mix. Avoid damp conditions, including wet grass, when using electricity.
