

# RUMMAGE RAMPAGE PROVIDES NEW HOMES FOR USABLE ITEMS

The annual Rummage RAMPage is back for its sixth year! The community sale will be held from Friday, July 29, through Saturday, Aug. 6, at the Ames Intermodal Facility parking ramp, 129 Hayward Ave. The City of Ames, in partnership with the ISU Office of Sustainability, hosts this community garage sale designed to keep reusable items out of the waste stream.

The event grew from the desire to repurpose items often left on the curb during the annual move out and lease changeovers, and to keep these items out of the landfill. Rummage RAMPage works by selling items that are donated. Volunteers from local non-profit groups help run the sale and share in any profit. Rummage RAMPage has continued to grow each year, with the 2021 event



diverting more than 90,000 pounds of furniture and housewares from the landfill and raising more than \$40,000 for local non-profit agencies.

# AMES NAMED "TREE CITY USA"

The City of Ames has again been recognized by the Arbor Day Foundation and the Iowa Department of Natural Resources as a "Tree City USA" by demonstrating a commitment to caring for and managing public trees. To qualify for the Tree City USA award, a city must have either a city forester or an active city tree board, have a tree ordinance, spend at least \$2 per capita annually for its community forestry program, and have a tree planting and maintenance plan.

The City of Ames has been a recognized "Tree City USA" since 1983. The Tree City USA program is a national program that provides the framework for community forestry management for cities and towns across America. Ames has approximately 11,000 right-of-way trees, 3,500 park trees, and 700 to 800 acres of public-owned woodland areas. The Parks and Recreation Department and City Forester perform all the work necessary to maintain the health of these trees.

Trees absorb carbon dioxide, improve water quality through filtration and erosion control, provide temperature control and wind breaks, and support wildlife habitat necessary for biodiversity. # ENERGY Q&A

Q. I understand that scheduled maintenance is very important to operating a dependable, reliable electric system. However, I have concerns about how long a scheduled outage could last and what I'm supposed to do if I get a notice. Can you provide any tips?

A. Great question. Your apprehension is completely understandable. If customers get a letter in the mail, a text alert, or automated phone call saying a maintenance power outage is scheduled for their neighborhood, this is often followed by several thoughts. Is my food going to be OK? Will my dogs stay cool in the afternoon heat? Will my kids be able to cope without wifi and the electronic devices they use that depend on it? We know this is inconvenient and disruptive for the daily routine of our customers.

We're glad your question acknowledges the important role scheduled maintenance plays in keeping safe, reliable service for our customers today and into the future. The two primary reasons for maintenance outages is to replace aging infrastructure or to upgrade and modernize the distribution grid. We work hard to minimize the impacts to our customers, and that means we make every effort to keep scheduled maintenance outages to four hours or less.

According to Centers for Disease Control (CDC), unopened refrigerators can keep food safe up to four hours. The news



is even better for freezers. Freezers can keep food safe for 24 to 48 hours depending on how full the freezer is packed. (Full freezers can stay cold longer.)

Once customers have received notice of a scheduled outage, there are several things that can be done to make the experience go more smoothly.

- Shut off or disconnect all sensitive electronics before the outage to prevent damage or loss of data.
- Customers with an automatic garage opener or a community security gate should review the instructions and learn how to operate them manually.
- Customers with an alarm system should alert their security company of the outage. The outage will affect alarm systems and may affect private phone systems.

We understand no one likes to be without electric service, and we thank our customers for their patience and understanding while we make improvements.
