

POLICE ADVISORY GROUP HOLDS FIRST MEETING

In an effort to continually improve its service to the public, the Ames Police



Department recently hosted the inaugural meeting of the Ames Resident Police Advisory Committee (ARPAC). The volunteer commission was established by Ames Mayor John Haila and the

Ames City Council to bring a resident perspective into the resolution of complaints.

"Our first meeting was extremely productive," said Ames Police Chief Geoff Huff. "We want to make sure we are connecting with all our residents. ARPAC members will help us bring a voice to the underserved. We are looking forward to learning from their insight."

In addition to bringing a resident perspective into complaint resolution, ARPAC members will provide thoughtful recommendations regarding the policies and practices of the Ames Police Department, report concerns regarding complaint investigation outcomes to

the City Manager, and increase public confidence in the professionalism and accountability of the Ames Police Department.

ARPAC members are appointed by the Mayor. The current committee includes William Arce, Edna Clinton, Roberto Dubiel, Tim Rasmussen, Emily Rebollozo, Virginia Speight, and Chunhui Xiang.

New Community Garden Opens on Delaware Avenue

Ames Mayor John Haila and the City Council recently cut the green ribbon on the Community Garden on Delaware Avenue, the former site of a west Ames water tower removed in 2015.

The new garden expands the City's Community Garden program to include 61 plots at the Ioway Creek Gardens and 28 raised beds at Carr Park. Delaware Avenue Community Garden provides 14 ground-level beds, fencing, and a water hydrant.

"We have been able to repurpose this land as green space and provide additional community garden plots," said Parks and Recreation Director Keith Abraham. "The City's Community Garden program has been very

Ames City Council first directed staff to provide information about the possible expansion of the Community Garden program in 2020. Subsequently, staff conducted a survey and held two public input meetings to gauge community interest in adding garden plots. As a result, the Delaware Avenue site was identified and selected for a new community garden.

SMART WATERSHEDS PROVIDES NATIVE LANDSCAPING REBATE

Have you considered replacing some of your lawn with native landscaping? Maybe you have a steep slope that is difficult to mow or a shady or wet area where grass won't grow. These might provide the perfect opportunity to change part of your landscape to native vegetation.

The use of native plants in landscapes provides a connection to our prairie heritage. Once established, native plants are aesthetically pleasing and require little watering, fertilizing, or mowing. The reduced maintenance can lead to significant cost savings when compared to labor-intensive turf grass.

Native landscaping attracts songbirds, dragonflies, butterflies, and other desirable species. It also helps restore soil quality over time and helps landscapes absorb more



rainfall, reducing the amount of runoff from urban spaces.


The City of Ames Smart Watersheds Program has a rebate for up to \$350 for areas converted to native landscaping. The minimum area required is 100 square feet so you can start small if you like. Other program rebate incentives are for lawn soil quality restoration, native trees, native grass turf, rain gardens, composters, and rain barrels. 

Q: I'm in the market for a new car, and I'm considering going electric. How much would the charging affect my electric bill? How would the cost compare to what I spend on gasoline?

A: Great question! With gas prices so high right now, many people are thinking about electric vehicles (EVs). Let's calculate the cost per mile for each car to compare them. We'll assume the efficiencies of the cars are 30 miles per gallon and 3.5 miles per kWh. If you know the specific values for your car, you can use your own numbers.

Gasoline:
$$\frac{$4.50}{gallon} * \frac{gallon}{30 \text{ miles}} = $0.15/\text{mile}$$

Electric:
$$\frac{\$0.10}{kWh} * \frac{kWh}{3.5 \text{ miles}} = \$0.03/\text{mile}$$

By these calculations, the cost to fuel an EV is 80% less than that needed to operate a gasoline-fueled car.

Here are some more cost implications you should consider:

- Federal tax credits up to \$7,500 are available for many EVs. Check the current rebates for specific cars at: fueleconomy.gov/feg/taxevb.shtml
- EVs require much less maintenance because their mechanical systems are simpler than internal combustion engines.

Registration fees for EVs will be increased this year to contribute to infrastructure costs. Gasoline vehicles contribute to these funds through taxes at the pump.

Overall, the five-year cost of ownership is now similar between many EVs and their gasoline counterparts, even though you may pay a premium on the initial purchase. Consumer Reports completed a study in 2020 finding that "owning an electric vehicle will save the typical driver \$6,000 to \$10,000 over the life of the vehicle, compared to owning a comparable gaspowered vehicle."

If you're looking to find out more about EVs, check out PlugStar, a great website that has lots of information including a comparison of the total cost of ownership for both electric and internal combustion vehicles: https://plugstar.com/cars. Or, stop in at one of Ames' local dealerships and ask for more information.
