

PLAZA TO BRING YEAR-ROUND RECREATION DOWNTOWN

The Ames City Council has made redeveloping the municipal parking lot across from City Hall, 515 Clark Ave., into interactive open space a priority as part of their goal to create a fun, vibrant community that attracts and retains residents. Construction on the space, located east of City Hall between Fifth and Sixth streets, started on Sept. 6 and will continue

until the project is completed in June 2023. Work on Clark Avenue will start near the end of September and be completed before winter. The City has engaged the landscape architecture firm, Confluence, to design the plaza, and hired Henkel Construction Company as the contractor.

"It's very exciting to see construction start on this project," said



Corey Mellies, Ames Fleet and Facilities Director. "This area has been identified by the City Council as a redevelopment opportunity, and the new design will provide gathering space, showcase public art, and add more green, natural areas to Downtown. The plaza will complement our existing businesses and public spaces."

The new design includes an interactive water feature and ice skating ribbon to

promote year-round recreation. To replace lost parking, a new parking lot was built north of City Hall on Sixth Street. Also, new parking stalls are planned in front of City Hall to replace the 10-minute parking from the previous parking lot. The utility dropbox will be relocated during construction on Clark Avenue and will be put back in a dedicated parking stall once construction is complete.

FALL NO CHARGE YARD WASTE DAYS PLANNED

Story County residents can dispose of yard waste at no charge during Fall No-Charge Yard Waste Days planned in October and November. The scheduled Saturdays are Oct. 29, Nov. 12 (includes brush), Nov. 26, and Dec. 3, at Chamness/GreenRU, 400 Freel Drive. Hours are from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

A voucher option will again be offered for those unable to take advantage of the Saturday, Nov. 12, drop-off date, which includes brush. A voucher may be picked up in advance at the Resource Recovery Plant, 110 Center Ave. This voucher may be used from noon to 5 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 11, at 400 Freel Drive.

Those participating in Fall No-Charge Yard Waste Days are asked to enter the site from South Dayton Avenue, then west on Southeast Fifth Street, and north on Freel Drive. Drivers should exit the site north on Freel Drive to East Lincoln Way.

NEW Accessible Launch Installed at Ada Hayden

Ames Parks and Recreation
Department celebrated the new
accessible kayak/canoe launch
recently installed at Ada Hayden
Heritage Park with a ribbon-cutting
ceremony in September. The
accessible launch project is a publicprivate partnership between the City
of Ames and various local outdoor
recreation organizations that together
raised more than \$36,000 through the
"Access Ada Hayden" campaign.

The new launch allows adaptive paddlers, including those in wheelchairs or experiencing mobility issues, to transition into a canoe or



kayak more easily. The system uses a floating dock, a gangway with handrail, and an adjacent sloped chute to slide a kayak or canoe into the water. A sliding bench helps the paddler transition into the watercraft with overhead handrails and straps to assist.

"One of our goals in improving our recreational amenities is to ensure all residents can enjoy being outdoors," said Ames Parks and Recreation Director Keith Abraham. "We continue to seek ways to expand parks, facilities, and programs to be inclusive, and we encourage everyone to explore our offerings and share ideas with us for new options."

BUDGET MEETING PLANNED NOV. 1

ALREADY? AMES WATER PLANT HITS 5-YEAR MILESTONE

The Ames Water Plant, 1800 E. 13th St., recently celebrated the five-year anniversary of its 2017 grand opening ceremony. The ribbon-cutting and open house attracted nearly 2,000 people. The 15-milliongallon per day (MGD) water treatment plant replaced the more than 90-year-old facility located at 300 E. Fifth St.

Planning for the new plant began in 2008 when a study determined that the future needs of the Ames community could not be met by the current plant site. The entire cost of the project was nearly \$70 million. The new plant is the largest LEED-certified water treatment plant in Iowa.

ENERGY Q&A

Q: As we head into winter, what can I do to help keep my energy costs down?

A: Winter is coming. You can feel it in the air. Don't let the cold weather get you down, though. Here are some tips to keep you comfortable and save you money:

- Pull out your favorite winter sweaters, grab your blankets out of storage, and set your thermostat on the cooler side. You save by warming up yourself instead of the entire room or home.
- When out of the house, set your programmable thermostat to 58 degrees, and as low as 50 degrees when you're out of town. If your thermostat is not programmable, consider upgrading. Ames Electric Services offers rebates on wifi-enabled thermostats.
- Check your furnace filter. A dirty filter reduces furnace efficiency.

During the heating season, you should change your furnace filter once per month.

- It's never a bad time to consider upgrades to your home's insulation. If you feel overwhelmed or confused by the task of weatherizing your home, take advantage of a free energy audit through Ames Electric Services.
- If your furnace is getting old, start thinking now about a replacement. Consider savings from a high-efficiency furnace, or a geothermal or air source heat pump system that also provides highly efficient heating and air conditioning. Ames Electric Services offers rebates to help you with the investment, and you can save thousands of dollars a year on operating costs.
