

NEW PLAZA NAMED FOR LONG-SERVING AME S CITY MANAGER

In recognition of more than four decades of service to the residents of Ames, the Ames City Council recently approved the naming of the new Downtown Plaza as "Steven L. Schainker Plaza." In addition to unanimous City Council approval of the naming, two former mayors, Ted Tedesco and Ann Campbell, supported the honor. The Ames City Manager celebrated his 40th anniversary at the City's helm in October.

The Downtown Plaza project transforms the parking lot directly east of City Hall, 515 Clark Ave., into interactive open space. The plaza will provide yearround public amenities such as native landscaping, restrooms, water features

in warm weather, and ice skating when temperatures fall. To replace parking spaces, a new municipal lot has opened north of City Hall on Sixth Street and diagonal parking is being installed directly in front of City Hall.

"I have dedicated almost all of my professional life, 43 out of 45 years, to serving the residents of Ames in an effort to improve the quality of life for those who live, work, and visit our community," Schainker said. "While this honor is going to me, I want to give credit to the dedicated employees I have worked with over the years who remain committed to providing exceptional customer service to our residents. It is especially meaningful to me that the public space reflecting my name is in such close proximity to Ames City Hall."

RECYCLE YOUR CHRISTMAS TREE

Don't let your Christmas tree end up in the landfill. The City of Ames provides free disposal of Christmas trees at the Parks & Recreation Maintenance Shop, 700 E. 13th

St. Trees can be deposited during daylight hours through Tuesday, Jan. 31.



All trees will be recycled into wood chips, which will be used in Ames parks. The Parks & Recreation Maintenance driveway will be marked with a sign. The tree stand, tinsel, and

all ornaments should be removed before leaving the tree for disposal.

ARE YOU ON A SNOW ROUTE?

When the snow falls, it's important to move your vehicle if you park on a street that's part of the snow route. Snow routes

are marked with red and white signs. All vehicles must be removed from snow routes when the snow ordinance goes into effect.

How do you know when the snow ordinance is in effect? Pay attention to local media, check the City's website (www.CityOfAmes. org), or watch City of Ames and Ames Police social media! The snow ordinance goes into effect when snow accumulations are 2 inches



or more, but the best way to know if the snow ordinance will be in effect is to watch the weather!

STORY WALK INSTALLED AT PARK

ENERGY Q \checkmark **A**

Q How's the utility's solar project coming along? Is it producing as much energy as expected? Can I still participate by purchasing a part of the system?

Our SunSmart Community Solar project celebrates its second anniversary on Dec. 10, and we're excited to have a full two years of clean, green energy production. Developing a community solar project was a goal of the Ames City Council, and the project was supported by many Ames residents seeking a renewable energy option. The 2-megawatt solar farm is located at 405 Airport Road. The system is producing just slightly more than the expected energy estimates.

And yes, there is still room for Ames Electric customers to participate. Customers can buy one, or many, "Power Packs." Each Power Pack represents the output of half of a solar module from the solar farm. Participants receive an on-bill credit each month based on the amount of energy produced by the project.

Since its inception, solar farm participants have received a credit that has averaged about \$1 per month per Power Pack. The credit is higher in the summer and lower in the winter due to the amount of solar energy available. The cost of a Power Pack is \$270.



Here are some fun facts about SunSmart. Over the 20-year life of the project, each Power Pack could:

- produce enough electricity to power one average Ames home for about nine months
- offset 10,000 miles driven by car
- take one car's emissions off the road for a year
- reduce CO2 equal to about as much removed by one acre of trees
- reduce CO2 emissions by about five tons
