


# ARE YOU READY? RAGBRAI ARRIVES ON JULY 25!



Thousands of bicyclists, support vehicles, and guests are expected to arrive in Ames from Carroll on Tuesday, July 25, as part of the Register's Annual Great Bicycle Ride Across Iowa (RAGBRAI). As RAGBRAI celebrates its 50th anniversary, the crowds are likely to be the biggest in the event's history.

RAGBRAI was last in Ames in 2018, and there are lots of ways to get involved in this year's event. Volunteers are needed to welcome riders, host bicyclists, help at campsites, and staff information areas.

Bicyclists will ride into Ames from

the west along Mortensen Road before heading north on Beach Avenue, and over to Jack Trice Stadium. Campsites will be located primarily at Stuart Smith Park and Brookside Park, but expect to see cyclists all over town. Plan ahead and give yourself extra time if you need to get around the community that day. Downtown Ames will serve as the hub for entertainment. Bicyclists will depart for Des Moines on Wednesday, July 26, by reversing their path out of Ames.

# REBATES OFFERED FOR NATIVE LANDSCAPING

Have you considered replacing some of your lawn with native landscaping? Do you have an area that's difficult to mow because of a steep slope or is frequently shady or wet? That part of your property might adapt well to native vegetation.



The use of native plants in landscapes provides a connection to our prairie heritage. Once established, native plants are aesthetically pleasing and require little watering, fertilizing, or mowing. Reduced maintenance can lead to significant savings compared to labor-intensive turf grass.

Native landscaping attracts songbirds,

dragonflies, butterflies, and other desirable species. It also helps restore soil quality over time and helps landscapes absorb more rainfall, reducing the amount of runoff from urban spaces.

The City of Ames Smart Watersheds Program has a rebate for up to \$350 for

areas converted to native landscaping. The minimum area required is 100 square feet, so you can start small if you like. Other rebates offered include incentives for lawn soil quality restoration, native trees, native grass turf, rain gardens, composters, and rain barrels. # AMES NAMED "TREE CITY USA"

The City of Ames has again been recognized by the Arbor Day Foundation and the Iowa

Department of Natural Resources as a "Tree City USA" by demonstrating a commitment to caring for and managing public trees. To qualify for the



Tree City USA award, a city must have either a city forester or an active city tree board, have a tree ordinance, spend at least \$2 per capita annually for its community forestry program, and have a tree planting and maintenance plan.

The City of Ames has been a recognized "Tree City USA" since 1983. Tree City USA is a national program that provides the framework for community forestry management for cities and towns across America. Ames has approximately 11,000 right-of-way trees, 3,500 park trees, and 700 to 800 acres of publicowned woodland areas. The Parks and Recreation Department and City Forester perform all the work necessary to maintain the health of these trees.

Q: I have an older air conditioning unit that my heating contractor managed to keep going last summer. I'm afraid it doesn't have a lot of life left in it. What should I look for when I'm replacing my AC this summer? Any other tips for me when I'm making this choice?

**A:** Great question. I have two main points for you to consider:

First, if you think your furnace or air conditioner is going to need replacement sometime soon, plan NOW for how you're going to do that. About 80 percent of heating and cooling replacements are done when the existing system is already failing or has failed. That's not fun for you or your contractor to work under that time frame. You're likely to be uncomfortably hot (or cold, depending on the season) while trying to make a choice about what equipment will be in your home for the next 15 to 20 years. Further, if you need an emergency replacement, your choices will be limited to what your contractor already has in storage. You might want a broader range of options to choose from.

Secondly, the best air conditioner unit to cool your home is actually a heat pump that can cool AND heat your home. We've talked about heat pumps before (back in December). A heat pump is a two-in-one machine that is more efficient than an AC, makes life more comfortable, and saves you money.

Our Smart Energy Rebates for heat pumps are larger than our rebates for a standard, cooling-only AC. And there



are great tax incentives that can help pay for a heat pump. A heat pump that can keep you cool can also keep you warm in very low temperatures. If you have a furnace, you may barely need to use it, if at all. (This is usually referred to as a hybrid system and is a great way to ease off gas). If you're excited about running your whole home on electricity, you should consider a cold-climate certified heat pump that can pump out heat all the way down to -17 degrees with no furnace required!
