#### ENJOY AMES' EXTENSIVE COLLECTION OF PUBLIC ART

Did you know the Public Art Commission (PAC) manages over 100 sculptures installed throughout the community? You'll find unique works of art in city parks, Downtown, and in many Ames neighborhoods. Outdoor public art encourages conversation, sparks imagination, and transforms spaces.

Here are some tips to ensure these works can be enjoyed for years to come.

Take photos! Check out the art from different angles, in different seasons, and at different times of the day. Ask others what they think about the art. In most cases. the name of the artist and the sculpture are on a plaque nearby. Check out what other works the artist has produced.

The art selected for outdoor display is durable, but can be damaged if abused. Avoid climbing or hanging on sculptures unless there's a

sign saying that kind of play is welcome. Some pieces are very heavy or have intricate parts that can be broken by excessive handling. It's also important not to attach items like posters or fabric to sculptures, as these can damage the finish.

### OLD WATER PLANT DEMOLITION INCLUDES RECYCLING OF MATERIALS

When the new Ames Water Treatment Plant, 1800 E. 13th St., began supplying water to residents in 2017, the former plant was officially

retired. For nearly a century, the Ames Municipal Water Plant at 300 E. Fifth St. had been continually operating, and the building was at the end of its useful life. As part of the demolition process, the City set goals to minimize construction waste sent to area landfills. LinnCo Inc., of Sartell, Minn., the contractor hired to complete the demolition, is required to

recycle 90 percent (by weight or volume) of the total waste generated by removing the former plant. LinnCo Inc. is achieving that goal through salvaging reusable materials for backfill, resale, or storing for future use. Additionally, the City is reusing brick from the water tower structure in upcoming renovations and projects to maintain the historic connection to the old water plant.

# Moving Soon? Don't Forget Plants and Pets

Graduating, moving, or leaving over a school break are all very exciting changes, but these events may pose some logistical questions. How are you going to move your aquarium? Who will watch your pet if you move? Does your new apartment allow snakes?

There are many decisions to be made, but this one is always wrong: never dump your tank into a waterway or release your pet into the wild. Most pets released to



the wild do not survive, and many suffer before they die. If they do manage to survive, they can wreak

major havoc! Releasing non-native plants or animals into natural areas can harm the environment and the economy.

Many plants used in aquariums become invasive species if introduced into a natural system. Some of the most notorious invasive species in the United States were originally sold as pets or plants for water gardens and aquariums. Prospective pet owners should make sure they will be able to accommodate all life stages of a pet before buying or adopting it. If your circumstances change, the responsible choice is to find your pet a new home.

If you are not able to place your pet with another caring owner, contact the Ames Animal Shelter (515.239.5530), a natural resource agency, or even a pet store near you. The knowledgeable personnel in these places can help you find the right place for your pet.

Q: What are some things I should consider when taking care of my lawn this summer? Are electric lawn mowers a viable option for homeowners?

A: Electric lawn equipment offers a triple win – it creates less noise, almost no pollution, and is a low-cost, no-hassle way to keep your lawn and garden looking fresh. There are a wide variety of options in the market from push or riding mowers to any type of trimmer, cutter, edger, or blower you can think of. Most equipment manufacturers offer a standard, interchangeable battery that can be used to operate multiple tools within their offerings.

One of the most noticeable things about most electric equipment is that it is far quieter than its equivalent gasoline-powered counterparts. I like to tell people that while having electric lawn equipment is great, an even better thing is having neighbors with electric lawn equipment.

The pollution reduction benefits of a switch to electric outdoor lawn equipment are two-fold. By eliminating fuel completely from your yard, you eliminate any local air pollution that mowers and other gasoline powered equipment produce. Two-cycle equipment is especially dirty and smelly for you as an operator. Additionally, switching from gasoline-powered equipment to electric can reduce the resulting greenhouse gas emissions by over 75 percent. Gasoline burned from lawn

equipment might not be a huge source of emissions overall, but every bit can help.

Last of all, both the annual maintenance and energy costs for electric equipment can be lower than gasoline models.

An electric mower eliminates the need



for gasoline and oil – no more runs to the gas station before you mow. And while it doesn't cost a whole lot to buy gas for a mower, electricity is an even cheaper source of energy.

While electric power equipment may have historically had a higher upfront cost, there's now a wide range of products available at similar price points to their gasoline counterparts. A quick skim through the shelves of your hardware store or big box retailer will show you that much of the new equipment sales are electric. Ames Electric Services has a \$50 rebate, new in 2023, for battery electric mowers to help you make the switch.
