

### FITCH FAMILY INDOOR AQUATIC CENTER MOVES FORWARD

The Fitch Family Indoor Aquatic Center contiues to move forward and recently achieved two signficant milestones. In November, the Ames City Council approved sending the plans out for bid. In December, staff learned they had received \$500,000 towards the project in Iowa Community Attraction and Tourism (CAT) funding. The total cost of the project is estimated at \$XX million.



Although the facility was going to feature geothermal wells, testing on the site revealed hard, sandy shale that could not support a horizontal well field. The facility will be built with a traditional, high-efficiency heating and cooling system, but will be constructed with the ability to all rooftop solar panels. On site stormwater management includes bioretention cells in the southwest

The Fitch Family Indoor Aquatics Center will be constructed at the intersection of North Oak Street and Lincoln Way on property formerly owned by the Iowa Department of Transportation. With the demolition of the City's Municipal Pool in 2022, there has been a need in the community for indoor, recreational aquatics. The new facility will feature three basins including a lap pool, current channel and play area, warm water pool, and a slide.

and northwest corners of the site, and permeable pavers and underground storage in the parking lot.

The Fitch Family Indoor Aquatics Center will provide a year-round opportunity for swim lessons, water recreation, lap swimming, and therapeutic support. The proposed construction timeline begins in April 2024, and the facility is anticipated to be complete in fall of 2025. Look for information on a groundbreaking this spring!

The City of Ames began preparing for the Fiscal Year 2024-25 budget last fall with a series of internal staff meetings. Work continues throughout the winter months as each department's budget is reviewed internally prior to presentation to the Ames City Council. There are still plenty of opportunities to get involved.

In February, three meetings are planned for representatives of each of the City's departments to present an in-depth review of proposed budgets. All budget meetings will be held in the City Hall Council Chambers, 515 Clark Ave., and will be streamed on City of Ames Facebook and YouTube. A wrap-up of the budget will be held at 5:15 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 13.

Setting the maximum levy rate will take place at the Council meeting beginning at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 27, and the final budget hearing is scheduled for 6 p.m. on Tuesday, March 12. It will include an opportunity for public comments. This is also a regularly scheduled City Council meeting.

Like all Iowa communities, the City of Ames must submit its budget to the State of Iowa for certification by the end of March. Budget documents for the current fiscal year are posted on the City's website, and draft documents for 2024-25 will be posted by early February.

## ENERGY Q&A

Q. I am giving a hard look at an air-source heat pump after hearing that my natural gas provider will be raising their rates. What should I consider when looking to reduce gas usage in my home?

You're on the right track considering a heat pump. Heating is the largest use of gas in your home and heat pumps can dramatically reduce (or eliminate!) gas needed for space heating.

Air source heat pumps look very similar to a conventional air conditioner, but they can heat and cool your home or business. If you are looking to upgrade your heating and cooling system, an air source heat pump is an excellent option. You'll want to consider whether to install a heat pump that works in conjunction with a gas furnace or if you want to install an allelectric heating system that relies solely on the heat pump.

A heat pump and a furnace is often called a "hybrid system" and uses the furnace only during the coldest parts of the year. This configuration can cut your gas heating needs by half or more compared to a system that uses a furnace and a cooling-only air conditioner.

Standalone air source heat pumps rely only on the heat pump for heating and cooling and come with an electric heater as back up. If you choose a standalone heat pump without a furnace, you should choose a model that is Energy Star Cold Climate Certified. Cold Climate certified heat pumps stay efficient and maintain their heat output even at below-zero temperatures.

Geothermal heating and cooling systems are even more efficient than air source heat



pumps, but these systems require a more significant upfront investment. The good news is that Smart Energy rebates are available from Ames Electric to help defray some of the cost. You can get more information on Smart Energy rebates at www. CityOfAmes.org/SmartEnergy.
