DOWNTOWN PLANNING DESIGNED TO BUILD SUCCESSFUL FUTURE

Downtown Ames is the heart of our community for social and business needs of many residents. Ames City Council, in partnership with Ames Main Street, wants to evaluate and plan options for its continued success. That's why resident input to identify priorities for the evolving area is so important. The kickoff of a seven-month Downtown Plan process focused on the community interests for Downtown begins in May.

The Ames Main Street Association has selected the urban planning consultant team of Bolton and Menk to assist with gathering public input and evaluating the opportunities and project options for Downtown. The vision of Downtown as



the cultural, economic, and social center of the community relies on private and public investment to meet the needs and interests of the community. The new Downtown Plan is intended to address tangible near-term project ideas and longterm goals while considering additional businesses, events, activities, and other investment opportunities that could enrich the character of Downtown and attract more community interest.

Downtown isn't just a front door into the community – it is community! We need everyone to help shape the plan and priorities for private and public investments. Look for public input opportunities such as online surveys, online meetings, as well as in-person pop-up events

Sewer Rate Increase to Begin in July

A 7 percent increase in sewer rates will go into effect for bills due on and after July 1, 2024. The rate adjustment is a reflection of increased operating costs as well as a planned improvement at the Water Pollution Control Facility to achieve higher nutrient removal rates in support of Iowa's Nutrient Reduction Strategy.

To mitigate the increase, remember that when you reduce your water use, you not only save on the cost of water but on sewer as well. For most customers, your sewer bill is based on your water usage. Regularly inspect your property and repair any leaks quickly.

Water use outdoors can be a great place to save. Inspect irrigation systems for frozen or broken lines and make sure heads are only delivering water to plantings that truly need to be watered. Consider investing in a rain barrel to help with your outdoor watering and converting traditional turf into low impact, native plantings that need less water. Rebates are available to reduce some of the initial investment at www.CityOfAmes.org/ SmartWatersheds.

RUMMAGE RAMPAGE 2024 IS COMING!

Mark your calendars for the seventh annual Rummage RAMPage, which begins with donations drop-off on Friday, July 26, and continues through Saturday, Aug. 3, as the final day of shopping.

The City of Ames, in partnership with the ISU Office of Sustainability and local non-profit organizations, holds this community-wide garage sale to keep reusable items out of the waste stream. Items are donated for sale, and



volunteers from local non-profit groups help run the sale and share in any profit. The event is held at the Ames Intermodal Parking Ramp, 129 Hayward Ave.

"We started this event with a desire to repurpose items often left on the curb during the annual move out and lease changeovers. We wanted to reduce waste and keep usable items out of the landfill," said Ames Sustainability Coordinator Merry Rankin. "Many people are moving at this time of year, and this event provides an alternative for residents who are not only looking to dispose of household goods, but also acquire still-usable items that might be thrown in the trash or randomly dumped otherwise."

SMART ENERGY REBATES

Through its Smart Energy programs, Ames Electric Services is here to help customers reduce their electric costs through the implementation of more energy efficient practices. The utility has offered rebates on energy-saving upgrades for its customers though the Smart Energy program since 2007. We regularly evaluate our Smart Energy rebate offerings to help better serve our customers.

Our goal is to provide incentives that encourage customers to invest upfront in more efficient products in order to realize future energy savings and reduced costs. We recently made some changes to simplify how rebates are calculated.

The solar rebate is now calculated by the system's installed size. Also, heat pump and air conditioner rebates have been compressed to two rebate tiers.

Smart Energy rebates help our customers save money, while helping to reduce the utility's peak energy needs, all while working towards the city's ambitious climate goals. In addition to Air Source Heat Pumps, A/Cs, and solar, there are also Smart Energy Rebates for Energy Star® appliances, induction stoves, battery electric lawn mowers, geothermal heat pumps, heat pump water heaters, and electric vehicle chargers.
