

RUMMAGE RAMPAGE RETURNS TO THE AMES INTERMODAL FACILITY

Excitement is building for the eighth annual Rummage RAMPage, a community garage sale designed to keep reusable items out of the waste stream. Held over nine days at the Ames Intermodal Parking Facility, 129 Hayward Ave., the event is staffed by volunteers who share in the proceeds based on hours worked.

Last year's event found homes for more

than 154,843 pounds of furniture and housewares and raised just over \$62,000 for 47 local non-profit agencies.

As the City of Ames looks for ways to promote the community Climate Action Plan, events like Rummage RAMPage provide options for residents to both donate materials that are still usable and shop for items needed rather than purchase something new. Reducing

waste is one way of keeping items out of landfills and reduces greenhouse gases.

Because donations are accepted through Friday, Aug. 2, inventory changes on a daily basis. Shoppers are encouraged to stop by frequently to find items ranging from housewares, furniture, sporting goods, unique finds, and antiques. For more information, go to www. CityOfAmes.org/RummageRampage.

NEW PICKLEBALL COURTS READY FOR PLAY

Ames Parks and Recreation Department, in collaboration with the Ames Pickleball Club, recently hosted a ribbon-cutting ceremony to celebrate the new pickleball courts at Emma McCarthy Lee Park, 3400 Ross Road. The event, which included pickleball demonstrations,



attracted more than 150 participants.

Two tennis courts were converted to six dedicated pickleball courts. The project included new fencing to separate the courts, as well as new nets and net posts. The remaining tennis courts were resurfaced with new boundary markings to be used as both tennis and pickleball courts. The Ames Pickleball Club is donating windscreens and a storage box for portable nets.

"We're excited to offer these new courts



to our growing population of pickleball players," said Keith Abraham, Director of Parks and Recreation. "Pickleball is a fun sport and we have seen more and more demand by community members for additional places to play. While all tennis courts at City parks are striped for pickleball, this project provides the first dedicated courts."

Over the years, Ames parks have been severely damaged by fireworks. The Ames Fire Department encourages residents to leave the fireworks show to the professionals and celebrate responsibly.

AMES NAMED "Tree City USA"

The City of Ames was recently honored with the 2023 Tree City USA Award by the Arbor Day Foundation and the Iowa Department of Natural Resources. The award was accepted by City Forester Gabriele Edwards and Maintenance Worker Matt Rochford, both with Ames Parks and Recreation.

"The Tree City USA award represents a commitment to growing and diversifying our urban forest," said Forester Gabriele Edwards. "For decades, Ames has led by example to other Iowa communities by enhancing our forest resources and demonstrating the value of trees now and into the future."

Additionally, Ames was one of 21 Iowa communities to qualify for Tree City USA Growth Award, which recognizes Tree City USA communities that demonstrate even higher levels of tree care and community engagement during the year.

The Growth Award looks at five focus areas that include criteria such as community investment in a forestry team, tree inventory, tree plans, planting and maintaining trees, outreach, awareness, and education.

While the City of Ames has had Tree City USA status since 1983, this is the first year the City has qualitifed for the Growth Award.

ENERGY QYA

Q: I've been thinking about getting solar panels for my home. Is that a good option to generate clean energy? What questions should I ask when selecting a solar installer for my home? What are some other options I should consider?

A: Solar is a great way to generate clean electricity and there are several different ways that you can choose to go solar in Ames.

If you have adequate space on your roof that is shade-free for the middle of the day, your own solar system may be a good choice. A solar installer can help you assess whether your home would be a good fit and should provide you with an estimate of how much energy you could expect given the size of the system proposed, the orientation of your roof, and any shading that could affect your production.

You should ask installers if they are familiar with how Ames Electric rates address individual solar installations. They would need that information to provide you an estimate on the value or payback period of a proposed system. Ames Electric Services offers a rebate for customer-installed solar of \$100 per kW installed. Additionally, the federal tax credit can cover up to 30% of the overall cost of solar.

Ames Electric Services also offers the SunSmart community solar program to its customers. SunSmart is a 2MW solar

field located near the James Herman Banning Municipal Airport. The project makes clean, solar energy accessible



to customers with shaded roofs, those who live in apartments, rent their homes, or cannot install solar panels on their own property. It offers a turnkey solar program for any Ames Electric customer.

Customers of Ames Electric Services can buy shares in the solar farm, called "Power Packs." Each Power Pack is a one-time investment and represents 175 watts of generating capacity. As of January, the price of a Power Pack is \$240. Owners of Power Packs will receive monthly credits on their utility bill. Bill credits have averaged around \$1 per month and are based on the actual production of the solar farm.
